




The TRC actively fosters and facilitates engagement with public and private agencies, as well as research opportunities for both graduate and undergraduate-level students. Each semester, between 15-20 students work directly with TRC staff on funded and original research projects. In 2020, the <a href="Crime and Security Data Analytics Lab">Crime and Security Data Analytics Lab</a> (CASDAL) was established in the TRC to meet the analytical needs of students, faculty, and external partners by providing dedicated technology and space for research projects relating to crime and security issues.

# IN REVIEW


The TRC accomplished several research, educational, and outreach objectives while continuing to adapt to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic during the 2021-2022 academic year.

## RESEARCH OUTPUT & FUNDING

A significant achievement for the TRC over the last year included the completion of the American Terrorism Study Court Record Repository (ATSCORR) project. This three-year, federally funded project produced a web-based tool for use by US Attorneys, intelligence analysts, and researchers to access TRC-housed data and documents. Publication highlights include a published study of women in terrorism and an edited book volume. The TRC was also awarded a new three-year project from the National Institute of Justice (see Page 3). We also worked to make our research products more available by expanding our website and increasing our social media engagement.

## STUDENT RESEARCH & NETWORKING OPPORTUNITIES

Along with facilitating student research, the TRC provided several additional opportunities for student research, networking, and skill development. For instance, the Crime and Security Data Analytics Lab (CASDAL) hosted a student crime analysis training session, our graduate students traveled to and presented in Chicago, Illinois at the annual meeting of the American Society of Criminology, and TRC interns attended a session with local representatives from the FBI Field Office. Past networking and informational events have also been held with representatives from the National Counter Terrorism Center and Central Intelligence Agency.



# 2022-2023 ACTIVE FUNDED RESEARCH PROJECTS

## **Project Title**

From Dot Coms to Pipe Bombs: Online Radicalization and Mobilization to Violence

### **Funding**

\$893,721 from the National Institute of Justice

## **Purpose**

The "Dot Coms" project is focused on comparing risk and protective factors across forms of domestic and international terrorism, extremism and cybercrime. In other words, what factors - including the offender's background, online presence, and attitudes - influence whether someone escalates to violence?

### **Project Title**

Investigating Contested Theories on Extreme-Right Terrorism (INCONTEXT)

#### **Funding**

\$1.64 million from the Research Council of Norway

#### **Purpose**

This project is a cross-national research collaboration that endeavors to test the applicability of criminological theories for explaining various forms of violent extremism by collecting and analyzing data on violent plots.

# **CASDAL PROJECT PARTNERSHIPS**

Established in 2020 and housed in the TRC, the Crime and Security Data Analytics Lab (CASDAL) is designed to meet the analytical needs of students and faculty, and coordinate work on several different projects with both public and private partners. CASDAL has several ongoing active partnerships worth more than \$1.7million collectively, including:



## Using Community Schools as a Hub for Promoting Personal Resilience and Neighborhood Empowerment

Assisting students and families within the Stephens Elementary School Community, which experiences a disproportionate amount of violence, calls-for-service, and poor health indicators. Crime and risk mitigation is two-fold with targeted in-school resource alignment and community-driven involvement to create safer and healthier places, including two new community social workers.

## TRAIN Partnership - Assess and Act: A Children's Advocacy Centers Response to ALL Children Experiencing Trauma

Collaborative focus on child maltreatment incidents in Benton County to understand where incidents are occurring and better inform resource allocation.





## Chattanooga Police Department: Scenic City Crime Gun Intelligence Center (CGIC)

This partnership between law enforcement and researchers centers on examining a multitude of gun-involved incidents along with CPD's implementation efforts related to the deployment of resources acquired through the award.

## **DATA & CRIME ANALYSIS RESOURCES**

CASDAL personnel work with students and faculty to produce publicly accessible resources on the topics of data analysis, including a set of Technical Guides, Academic Article Summaries, and a YouTube channel that demonstrates crime analysis and data management skills for a variety of platforms.
